Seeking Policy Analysts in Behavioral Health, Aging, and Disability

The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation (ASPE) is the principal advisor to the Secretary of HHS on policy development, including major activities in policy coordination, legislative development, policy research, program evaluation, and economic analysis.

Within ASPE, the **Office of Disability, Aging, and Long-Term Care Policy (DALTCP)** focuses on policies and programs that support the independence, productivity, health and well-being of people with disabilities, people with behavioral health conditions, and older adults.

DALTCP's portfolio includes substance use disorder and mental health treatment and coverage policy, long-term services and supports across a range of provider settings and payers, consumer directed community-based supportive services, Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, and behavioral health and long-term care financing through Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance.

Positions:

DALTCP is currently seeking **PMFs**, **detailees**, **and/or summer interns** to engage in policy research and analysis related to the financing, delivery, and quality of services and supports for people with disabilities, serious mental illness, and/or substance use disorders. Specifically, we are seeking:

- Up to **two** (2) **behavioral health policy analysts**: examples of topics analysts may cover include efforts to combat the opioid epidemic, reducing the treatment gap/stigma, addressing SUD privacy complexities, behavioral health IT, and insurance reimbursement for substance use and mental health services.
- Up to **two (2) aging and disability policy analysts**: examples of topics analysts may cover include improving disability measurement, broadening approaches to long-term services and supports financing, and addressing the burden of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias.

Responsibilities may include responding to requests for policy analysis and developing and/or managing policy research and evaluation.

Qualifications:

Possessing, or currently pursuing, Masters and/or Doctoral degrees in social and behavioral sciences, economics, public policy, public affairs, public health, statistics, demography, and social work, among others.
